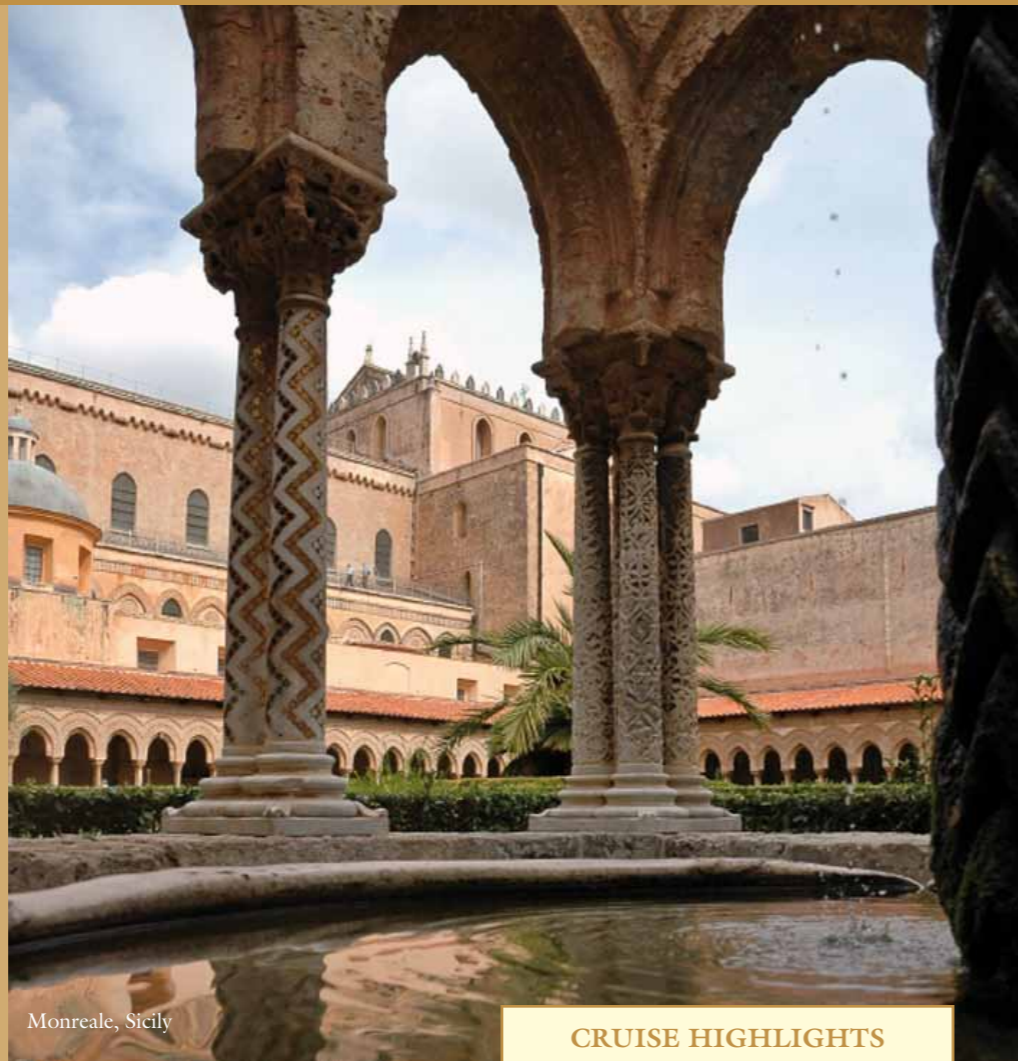

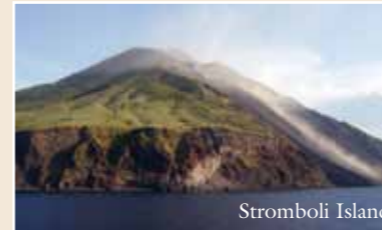

### See the volcanoes of the Mediterranean

Dr Peter Cattermole, volcanologist, will be discussing how the volcanoes of the Mediterranean have been pivotal in shaping the region. The visible force of their impact remains for all to see in Sicily, where *Minerva*'s first port of call here brings you to Catania. Explore the city, constructed from lava that poured down from Mount Etna in the 1669 eruption or, in the company of Dr Peter Cattermole, ascend Mount Etna by cable car and 4x4 vehicles.

At Naples you can choose to hike up Mount Vesuvius, which looms ominously over the ruined cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum. Mr Jeremy Paterson will be probing further into the fate of the ancient cities at Vesuvius' mercy.

*Minerva* then takes you southward to Lipari, where an evening close cruise of Stromboli will be lit by the active volcano's glowing red lava. The following morning, waiting to be explored, is the nearby island of Vulcano, to which all other volcanoes owe their etymological heritage.

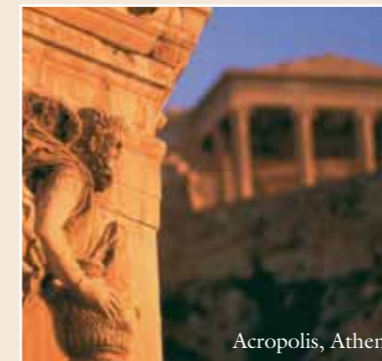
Stunning natural beauty, combined with an eclectic mixture of philosophy and history, promise a cruise as memorable as the volcanoes it visits.

### Go on a philosophical journey

On ‘Volcanoes of the Mediterranean’, Swan Hellenic introduces a philosophical nuance to your cruising experience. Follow in Plato's footsteps as you start your journey in his home city of Athens, where the outstanding Acropolis and its accompanying museum set the exceptional tone for the rest of your cruise.

Remembering Plato's legacy will be Professor Keith Ward FBA, whose philosophical talks will include a number of other equally enlightening topics, such as Greek gods and ‘Politics and Philosopher-Kings’. In a particularly interesting twist, which combines philosophy and volcanology, he will be contemplating the merciless force of nature, posing the intriguing question ‘Volcanoes: Is nature cruel?’

From Catania you can also visit Syracuse, a favourite of Plato's and – according to Cicero – Greece's greatest and most beautiful city.

### Learn about the region's history

From Piraeus, *Minerva* makes an early evening transit through the steep-sided Corinth Canal; as the sun sets, marvel at the ease with which she negotiates this staggering feat of engineering. This brings you to the ancient site of Olympia, where Mr Jeremy Paterson's illuminating talk on ‘The real Olympic games’ will bring your experience of this site into the 21st century.

Stopping at four ports in Sicily, this cruise provides ample opportunity to unearth the island's rich cultural and historical legacy; Dr Alan Borg will be discussing the distinctive mark that the Greeks and Normans have left behind.

Visits to La Goulette, Tunisia, and the richest sea port in ancient times, Carthage, are brought to life by Mr Jeremy Paterson with talks on the Punic wars of the ancient world, the Punic remains of Carthage and the Bardo museum.

Finally, *Minerva* sails into the Grand Harbour of Valletta, accompanied by a deck talk from Dr Alan Borg, Librarian of the Order of St John. Here you can explore St John's Co-Cathedral, exquisitely decorated in an array of silver, gold and marble.

### The ancient world in the modern day

Alongside its centuries-old history are the current events in this region which continue to grip us all. Prompted by the initial Jasmine Revolution in Tunisia, there has since been a wider wave of uprisings referred to as the ‘Arab Spring’. To bring your understanding of this region up to date, Professor Christopher Andrew will be on board to discuss these most recent developments.

At Knossos, Minoan architecture merges with a partial reconstruction and an authentic imagined setting for the mythical figure of the Minotaur; here ancient and modern meet to envision the palace's former glory and truly bring it to life.

Ancient and contemporary literally stand side by side in Athens, where close to the Acropolis is the extraordinary New Acropolis Museum. Whilst glass panels on the floor reveal recent excavations, a range of objects found from the sanctuaries on the slopes and an exhibit which spans from the Archaic period to the end of the Persian wars are also superbly displayed in the Art museum.

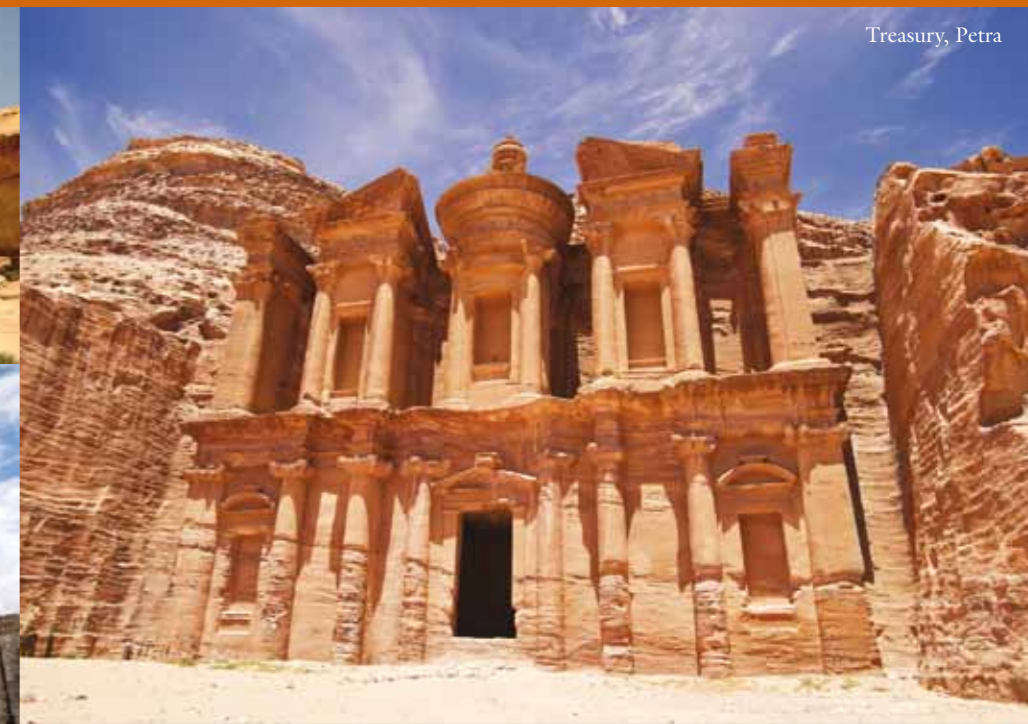

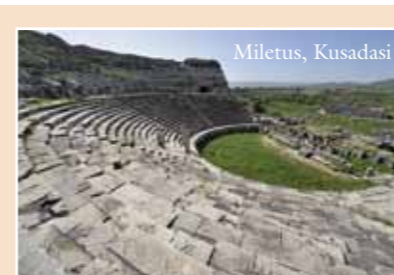

## See spectacular architecture

A theme throughout this cruise is the fascinating architecture you will see along the way. Making a long awaited return to Tripoli, Lebanon, we bring you an intriguing mix of modern and medieval. Here you will discover St Gilles Castle, an architectural fusion of Crusader, Mamluk and Ottoman influences.

Again, in Turkey, an alternative view of this destination awaits at Miletus, the first ‘planned city’. Designed around rectangular grids, it was built by Hippodamus. Credited by Aristotle with having ‘invented the art of planning cities’, he blazed the trail for modern architectural thought. At Miletus, you can see the city which serves as the earliest inspiration for modern day grid systems.

With integrated Guest Speaker talks and a fully inclusive shore excursion programme, you can learn all about the history of the architecture you encounter. ## Ancient historical sites

In Kusadasi, Turkey, time is seemingly suspended in Ephesus; the East Mediterranean’s best-preserved ancient city, it offers a vivid and dramatic insight into the life of a thriving port city in Roman days. Here the Library of Celsus and the theatre also still remain.

Turkey continues to treat you to fantastic Roman architecture in Antalya, where *Minerva*’s arrival at this Turkish port affords you a visit to Aspendos and its wonderfully preserved amphitheatre.

Finally, north-east of Aqaba lies the ancient city of Petra, the undisputed highlight of the Middle East. With a talk dedicated to this breathtaking site, Professor Robert Hillenbrand ensures you experience Petra in all its glory. Having lain undiscovered by Western eyes for several centuries, it is now reputedly called the eighth wonder of the ancient world; a whole city carved out of the vibrantly coloured rock which gives the ‘Rose red city’ its name.

## The captivating history from ancient to modern

In Turkey, a talk on the modern day from Professor Ian Beckett provides a counterpoint to the history you will see here, while his discussion of the Suez Canal reveals how this extraordinary feat of 19th century engineering has shaped the region. Meanwhile, Professor Carole Hillenbrand will be sharing her knowledge of Muslim women and the Arab Spring.

Enthralling history also awaits you at Aqaba, where Lawrence of Arabia helped lead an attack against the Ottoman Turks who had ruled there. Professor Ian Beckett will be on hand to discuss Lawrence and the legacy he has left behind.

Your adventure through Lebanon not only boasts the rare cedars, on which Canon Andrew Evans will be giving a talk, but also takes you to Beirut, and the idyllic fishing village of Byblos with its Roman remains, Crusader Castle and museum.

The oldest continually inhabited town, this destination offers another historical highlight on a cruise which truly transports you back in time.

## VOLCANOES OF THE MEDITERRANEAN



**DR ALAN BORG CBE FSA** started his museum career in the Royal Armouries in the Tower of London, moving in 1978 to become the first Director of the Sainsbury Centre for the Visual Arts at the University of East

Anglia. He was subsequently appointed Director General of the Imperial War Museum, and from 1995 Director of the Victoria and Albert Museum. He is currently Librarian of the Venerable Order of St John and Vice President of the Foundling Museum. His specialist subjects include art, architecture and military history.



**DR PETER CATTERMOLLE**

Formerly a lecturer in planetary geology and volcanology at the Universities of Wales and Sheffield, Peter Cattermole has worked with NASA on the volcanoes of Mars, and has worked and travelled widely

among the world's volcanic regions. Now a freelance specialist tour guide and lecturer he travels for a living, particularly to regions of geological interest. As an astronomer, he has appeared regularly on BBC TV's 'Sky at Night' and has co-authored books with Patrick Moore.



**MR JEREMY PATERSON**

taught ancient history for nearly 40 years at Newcastle University. He studied at Oxford and in Rome.

Although mainly a social and economic historian, his research and publications range widely from the ancient wine trade to early Christianity. He also chairs the 'Minimus' project to introduce Latin widely in primary schools. He has travelled extensively in the Mediterranean, a region on which he frequently lectures.



**PROFESSOR KEITH WARD**

**FBA** has held lecturer posts in Philosophy at St Andrew's and Philosophy of Religion at King's College London. He was Fellow, Dean and Director of Studies in Philosophy and in Theology at

Trinity Hall Cambridge, where he was also Lecturer in Divinity. He was also Professor and Head of Department of History and Philosophy of Religion at the University of London.

**PROFESSOR CHRISTOPHER ANDREW** is Professor of Modern and Contemporary History at Cambridge University, Honorary Professor at Queen's, Belfast, former Visiting Professor at Harvard, Toronto and Canberra,

and Honorary Air Commodore. He has presented numerous BBC documentaries. His latest book, *Defence of the Realm*, written as Official Historian of MI5, was last year's 'Politics' best-seller.



**MR CHRIS BRADLEY** is a

NADFAS lecturer specialising in North Africa and the Middle East. He is also a guidebook writer and photographer; his latest books include *The Berlitz Libya Guide 2009* and *Insight Egypt Guide 2008*.

He has also worked as a tour leader and guide of specialist art tours to Tunisia and Libya and as a cameraman and TV producer for the National Geographic, BBC and Channel 4.



**THE RT REVD TIM STEVENS**

read Classics and English at Cambridge and worked for BOAC and at the FCO prior to ordination in 1976. He was appointed Bishop of Leicester in June 1999. He is particularly interested in interfaith

**PROFESSOR IAN BECKETT**

**FRHistS** is Visiting Professor in Military History at the University of Kent. Previously, he has held chairs in both Britain and the United States. Chairman of the Council of the Army Records Society, he is

internationally known for his work on the Great War, the British Army and modern counter insurgency.



**PROFESSOR CAROLE**

**HILLENBRAND FBA OBE** is Professor Emerita, Islamic History, and former Head of Islamic and Middle Eastern Studies at the University of Edinburgh. In 2005 she was awarded the King Faisal

International Prize in Islamic Studies for her book *The Crusades; Islamic Perspectives*; she is the only non-Muslim ever to receive this award. Her latest book, *The Battle of Manzikert* (2007) concerns the history of Turkey.



**PROFESSOR ROBERT**

**HILLENBRAND FBA** has long-standing research interests in the clash of civilisations, especially between East and West. He is Professor Emeritus of Islamic Art at Edinburgh University. His

publications include studies on mosques, palaces and decorative arts in the Middle East, and on the relationship between Byzantium and Islam in the visual arts.



**CANON ANDREW EVANS** is an

honorary Canon of Bristol Cathedral and currently the Team Rector of Bridport in Dorset. He is also a Chaplain for the Royal British Legion and the Royal Naval Association. Before becoming a

parish priest Andrew taught for 17 years, finishing his career as a Deputy Head Teacher of an inner city comprehensive. A contemporary historian by training, Andrew is particularly interested in the history of the Royal Navy during the 18th to 20th centuries.

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
